## Purpose of the Workshop:

Newfoundland and Labrador is poised to lead Canada in economic growth this year. Booming industries foreshadow new wealth for the province. But as communities and industries flourish, water resources are stressed and those same stakeholders' livelihoods threatened. How can we learn from other provinces and each other to effectively manage our water and guide Newfoundland towards a truly sustainable, prosperous future?

"Striking a Balance" is a two-and-a-half day residential workshop for up and coming leaders in the region, aged 18-35 years. The program will focus specifically on the Northeast Avalon Region with the goal of building its capacity to effectively manage economic growth and resource protection by developing strong, informed future leaders with a commitment to and passion for healthy watersheds. Through experiential field tours, interactive dialogue sessions, mentoring and visioning exercises, the group will learn about the development-protection interface while envisioning sustainable management solutions across generations, sectors and cultures. **Don't miss this opportunity to meet local organizations and individuals leading the way in sustainable development, and youth peers who are ready to join you as tomorrow's smart decision makers!** 



What is a "residential workshop"? A residential workshop is a unique learning opportunity where participants stay at an off-site location and engage in collaborative exploration of complex issues through interactive experiences and facilitated dialogue sessions.

#### Location:

The workshop will be held at Circle Square Ranch Manuels (www.csranch.ca/manuels/), located just 26 km drive outside of St. John's. Participants will stay for two nights in the accommodation provided by Waterlution. Meals and activity costs are included in the \$40 registration fee (please see "Cost of Participation", Page 3).
